This is Annie's story written by Berrie Broderick. When you see Annie as she was, and Annie now, you wouldn't think it's the same dog. Berrie has worked wonders - just shows what love and care can do!

#### Annie's story:

The rain was dashing against the windows that dark night in March 2011 ... my sleeping lurcher, Ruby, sighed and turned over in her dreams, my grannie's clock ticking on the wall told me it was time to switch the laptop off, when an image appeared on the screen ... it was a white and black lurcher pup ... she had deformed legs, urine burns on her thin body and an empty look in her forlorn eyes ... she had been taken from a gypsy camp. There was something about this hound that grabbed at me, and I called my husband to look at her. We had been on the look out for a rescue hound ... she seemed as though she was asking for help, so we wrote to the rescue group in Ireland, offering her a home.

The next day they replied, saying that she was going to live in Scotland ... we thought that that was that, then two days later we got a phone call from a mutual friend asking us if we still wanted the pup ... of course we did! The lovely Scottish lady rang us explaining that she would let us have the pup as her old lurcher was now very ill, and she felt it was the wrong time to bring in a puppy ... we talked for ages.

Frantic phone calls then ensued over the next two days, between us and the Irish Rescue, and it was arranged that Annie ... that was the name they had given her, would leave Dublin with a shipment of rescue greyhounds and come on a ferry to Southampton ... could we drive down country and meet them some where? So that is what we did, and in a car park in Worcester we met Zoe ... the wonderful lady who had driven the van, and Annie ... Zoe told us how Annie had been taken straight to their vet and he felt that the little mite would be better 'PTS' ... he loaded his needle, then she looked at him and he changed his mind and said he would give her a chance ... he fashioned splints for her poor bent legs and prescribed various meds to help her.

We drove home with the little hairless hound with bent legs - she lay still on my knee the 100 miles back ... Annie recovered ... it took time ... she fitted in and seemed to do everything that was asked of her ... her heart was full of love for all who she met. Ruby and Annie became sisters ... We are so glad that on that dark wet night I stayed up late ... fate had a plan ... Now she is strong, has perfect legs, and runs like the wind ... the look in her eyes is one of the joy of living ... she is a delight, and has given us back more than we could ever have hoped for.



#### Vet's Corner ...

#### **Heatstroke / Exhaustion:**

With summer, supposedly, here we thought we would take a look at this problem. Dogs can very quickly succumb to the heat, and it **can** prove fatal.

What are some of the possible signs / symptoms of heat exhaustion?

- Excessive panting
- Tongue lolling
- Drooling
- Weakness
- Fainting
- Wobbly walking
- Heavy breathing

What can I do to prevent this happening to my dog?

- 1) Walk your greyhound early morning and late evening do not walk far during the day. Imagine putting your bare feet on a boiling hot pavement ouch ⊗
- 2) Keep your greyhound indoors do not allow him/her to lie outdoors in the sun. As with humans, even if the sun doesn't feel too hot it can, and will, burn.
- 3) Ensure that your dog has access to fresh drinking water at all times
- 4) If you have to travel with your greyhound, ensure that the car has been allowed to cool down before getting into it, and keep windows open / air conditioning on. **NEVER** leave your dog in a car on a hot day.
- 5) If your dog does succumb to heat stroke / exhaustion you need to take action quickly. Get cool water onto him/her, wet towels are good, and call the Vet.

#### Recipe ...

On the subject of summer, and the heat, try out this month's Recipe - a cooling summer treat for your dog ...

#### Frozen yoghurt and Peanut Butter Treats:

16oz natural yoghurt

½ cup peanut butter (can be melted in the microwave for about 30 seconds to make stirring easier!)

Mix together and scoop into ice-cube trays - easy © Yoghurt aids greyhound digestion, and can help with greyhound gas!!

#### 1) How long have you had Eddie & Wisp?

These dogs will give you unconditional love, but you have to be prepared to give them the same in return. The dog won't fit in around your lifestyle, you have to fit in around the dog. You will get so much enjoyment out of owning a greyhound.

Be patient with your new dog - they haven't all had the luxury of living in a home like other rescue dogs, and need time to adjust.

Don't be put off by their size! Once they are curled up on your lap, you won't even notice that they are there!

When out walking with the hounds, my dad got stopped by a woman asking him if he was interested in entering the dogs into a fly-ball competition. At first when my dad texted me I found the concept of this hilarious ... first of all, Eddie doesn't do chasing balls, but if there was a small dog this would be chase-able! For safety reasons I thought it best not to even consider Eddie.

Wisp on the other hand – she was still young, wasn't retired because of an injury and has so much energy sometimes I think she needs somewhere to channel it! However her retrieving skills leave a LOT to be desired.

Despite this, I arranged to go along to a session with Wisp and my other dog Roxy (a springer who lives at my mum and dad's house). To my surprise Wisp picked the sport up really quickly and was soon jumping over the hurdles, picking up the ball and running back to me with it! A new fly-ball champion in the making! Afterwards she slept for about 2 days straight - totally exhausted from all this exercise she had been doing.

I won't be making any money out of this sport, but feel it's a really good way of helping Wisp to get rid of some of her "puppy" energy and it goes to show you, Greyhounds can do SO much more than just run round a track!
