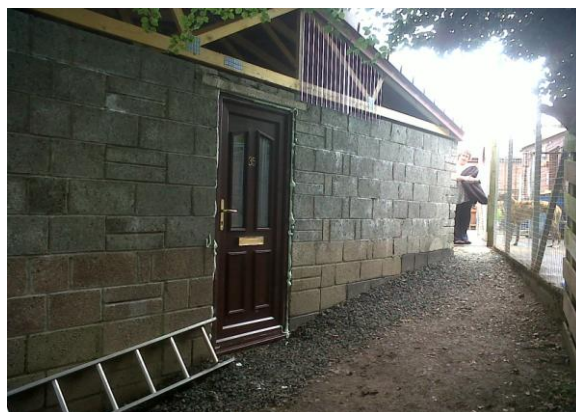
Planning Application ...

Vet's Corner ...

I have taken some of this from the 'Helps and Tips' page, as it serves as a useful reminder. When we first got our greyhound, for example, I had no idea that grapes would be bad for him.

Chocolate:

There have been a lot of articles in the news about the lethal effects of chocolate on dogs. Here's why - chocolate contains theobromine. Theobromine is a similar compound to caffeine, and stimulates the heart and nervous system. In dogs it can poison them, with death occurring from heart failure. Plain and dark chocolate contains more theobromine and is, therefore, more dangerous than milk chocolate if your dog ingests it. Theobromine stays in the dogs system for a long time - this means that chocolate poisoning can even occur if small amounts of chocolate are fed repeatedly. Also remember that cocoa powder, baking chocolate and other foods contain theobromine. In the November 2003 Issue of Dogs Today they also pointed out that Cocoa mulch (sold in garden centres) smells delicious to dogs but is highly toxic. Dog chocolate has had the theobromine removed, however, if it contains milk (see below) and sugar then it is probably best to avoid this as well. Personally, I won't give doggy chocs, as I feel that if my dog thinks it's ok to eat them, then he might just go for the 'real thing'.

Particularly with young children in the house, it can be very difficult to ensure that your dog doesn't get hold of chocolate. If you discover that your pet has ingested chocolate, contact your vet immediately - **do not wait until tomorrow, or until the surgery opens**. If the chocolate has only recently been consumed, the vet can give your dog an injection to make it vomit - **quick action must be taken**.

Cows' Milk:

Dogs, along with most other mammals lose, to a variable extent, their ability to digest lactose (milk sugar) with age, because the activity of the enzyme lactase declines with age. Source Manual of Companion Animal Nutrition and Feeding by BSAVA (British Small Animal Veterinary Association). Lactose cannot be broken down without the enzyme lactase. Dogs who are lactose intolerant may suffer from diarrhoea and/or flatulence when fed milk.

Raisins & Grapes:

The ASCPA (Animal Poison Control Centre in the USA) published information stating the toxicity of raisins and grapes in dogs. Eating just a handful of raisins and grapes has been shown to cause kidney failure. They do not know why, as yet, but it might be due to a pesticide sprayed on the grapes, or perhaps a type of mould found on the skin of grapes and raisins.

Some other things, in the home, which can be toxic to your pet are onions, salt, alcohol, lilies and tulips.

4) and the worst !?!

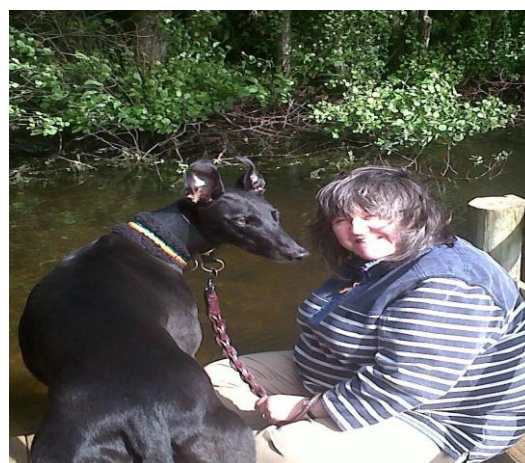
Maybe the lack of long lies at the weekend, but we are pretty good at going out early then all heading back to bed!

Recipe ...

Cheese Dreams:

Ingredients

3 cups wholemeal flour
2 teaspoons garlic powder
½ cup oil
1 cup grated cheese
1 cup rolled oats
1 beaten egg
1 cup milk

Method

Mix everything together, then knead for a few minutes until soft. Roll out to half an inch thickness and cut out with a shaped cutter (lots of doggy type ones, e.g. bones, on eBay!). Bake at 200 degrees celsius for 25 minutes, then remove from the oven and allow to cool on a wire rack.
