"We received a wonderful phone call today from Amy Wilson at Support Adoption for Pets. She told us that we were narrowly beaten out of the $10 \ge 50,000$ awards, but the panel had decided to re-consider our application. On reviewing our video, they decided to award us £45,000 !!!

This is an absolutely fantastic award, and will allow us to go ahead and refurbish our wooden Kennel. We are delighted, since this will ensure that our Kennel will be good enough to be in place many years after we have gone.

Thanks to everybody, too numerous to individually name, who helped us to achieve this and thanks to Amy, Justine and all the staff at Support Adoption for Pets who considered us good enough to give this award to. Without their help we, and many other rescues, would struggle. They are a wonderful organisation who should be very proud of what they have achieved.

Remember - the money used to help rescues comes from your Pets at Home VIP card so please, please use it when you shop there. Thank you all very much.



On the 12th September, we were all shocked and incredulous to hear the news that someone had, deliberately, set fire to the Manchester Dogs Home - at least 53 dogs died, and over 150 were injured during the fire. Many others had to find emergency re-homing. John put a beautiful piece on the website following this disaster, and I am copying it below.

Manchester Dogs Home

There was a special kennel maid who visited us that night, with hair like golden sunshine and wings of brilliant white.

At first we didn't see her through the smoke so black, but we knew that we must follow her our little, faithful pack.

The big dogs, the little dogs some with muzzles grey, woke from sleepy slumber they seemed to know the way.

She led us past the kennels up to a distant door, an exit that was new to us we'd not been this way before.

Although we were so frightened we formed an orderly queue, and in a golden re homing book she ticked as we went through.

The colours were so beautiful on rainbow flower beds, and then we saw a wooden bridge as forward we were led.

Our sore, burnt paws were healed, our coats no longer smoky and black, a rainbow appeared upon the bridge on every wooden slat.

> Then we finally saw him the Master of us all, we all rushed up to meet him when we heard him call.

The small dogs sat upon his knee the others at his feet, welcoming him like a dear old friend now our Journey was complete.

He said you are from Manchester your tragic story is well known, I'd like those to know, way down there, you're now re homed.

In loving memory of all the innocent little souls who lost their lives on the 12th of September - RIP

On Saturday 13th and Sunday 14th September, we held a 'Bag Pack' in-store - again, thank you to all who helped, and those who made this possible for us. On the Saturday, we raised ± 302.00 and on the Sunday, ± 360.00 ... great sums, I'm sure you will agree!

Sainsbury's Kinross store staff decided to do a sponsored 80 mile cycle run with all the proceeds going to GRF. The team were absolutely brilliant covering the 80 miles in a very respectable time. This month, your Rover Reporter is in the Vet's Corner ...

This month, we are covering two topics - the first is Pancreatitis and the second, tips for the dreaded Bonfire Night.

Pancreatitis:

Bootsie, your Rover Reporter, as many of you will know from the Forum, has not been well recently.



At first, it was thought that he had Colitis but upon doing blood tests, Bob discovered that he actually had Pancreatitis. This came as a blow to us, because Pancreatitis can be a life-threatening illness. So what is Pancreatitis, and how does it affect dogs? When your dog doesn't want to eat and is throwing up, you hope it's a passing thing. The majority of times it will be, probably down to something he / she has picked up whilst outside - dogs are terrible scavengers! It could, however, be a condition called Pancreatitis and, if so, he / she will need prompt treatment. The Pancreas is an organ near the stomach that helps digest food and control blood sugar, and the condition occurs when the pancreas becomes inflamed.

Pancreatitis can come on suddenly and then pass, or it can stay for longer periods. Your dog may suffer one attack and then no more or, as in Bootsie's case, he / she can have recurring attacks. Symptoms, too, can vary from dog to dog, but they become more extreme the longer the condition is left untreated. The symptoms in Bootsie's case were lethargy, pacing and mucusy diarrhoea. He was never sick, and didn't become dehydrated as some dogs, with this illness, do – we were lucky, as I say, that it was picked up very quickly by the highly knowledgeable Bob. We tend to be a bit over-cautious - something that Bob, at Vetrica, would willingly confirm, I am sure !!!! We took Bootsie to the vet on a Friday night and saw the locum - he pressed Bootsie's tummy and the poor boy just about shot through the roof with the pain. He was given a painkilling injection and antibiotics, on the assumption that this was Colitis.

When things hadn't improved greatly by the start of the following week, we returned to Vetrica and Bob decided to do some blood tests - these revealed that Bootsie had Pancreatitis. He was put on medication and we had to give him a low fat diet - nothing but ID Low Fat Prescription food, which a vet needs to prescribe. This comes in dry, kibble, and tinned form and, luckily, Bootsie wolfed it down! After a couple of weeks on this Bob suggested that we try moving, gradually, on to Chappie tinned & dry food. We did this but, before a week was out, he started suffering the same symptoms as before ... back to Bob! After further blood tests, we were told that the Pancreatitis had returned - this time we were told that Bootsie would probably have to remain on the Prescription diet for life.

Two things I would say:

- 1) Do not become paranoid (like us!) about watching your dog this is not healthy for you or your pet enjoy each other!
- 2) We have discussed Pet Insurance, many times previously, both on the Forum and in this Newsletter. Please be aware that Prescription food is not covered by Insurance (certainly not by Pet Plan) in cases of Pancreatitis, and a 12kg bag costs £70 !!!! If you can afford it, as well as your Pet Insurance, it may be a good idea to put a little away each month in case of such an eventuality. I know that a lot of you don't have Pet Insurance, but do put a set amount away each month for any necessary treatment. Nobody said having a dog was cheap, but between vet's bills and prescription food, we have racked up a hefty bill over recent weeks not that we grudge a penny of it, and Pet Plan did pay for all the medical treatment and medication, barring our excess.

Bootsie is keeping much better now - the only food he currently gets is the ID Low Fat Prescription diet - a mixture of the kibble and tinned food. He gets no other treats, whatsoever, now. This is hard, because we all know how much our greyhounds love their treats ... this having been said, I think we feel worse than him about with-holding that toast crust or bit of bacon! Bootsie has adapted amazingly well to his new regime and, hopefully, it will keep him healthy for many years to come.

Remember, Remember:

We are, as I write, well into October and as these things, sadly, appear to begin earlier every year, I would just like to remind our readers about the undesirable effects that the noise of fireworks can have on our pets. Bootsie is terrified of them.



Fireworks can look magnificent as part of an organised display, however, loud sporadic noises, that have no obvious source, can be both terrifying and confusing for your dog. Fireworks can also be extremely dangerous in the hands of people who don't know what they are doing or have, perhaps, had a few drinks.

Panicking animals can, and do, run away thus getting lost and / or injured. Here are a few tips for the coming weeks:

- 1) Possibly the MOST important thing is not to let your pet sense your own anxiety if he / she senses that you are uptight, then he / she will quickly follow suit. Stay calm, and do not make too much of a fuss!
- 2) At nightfall, close windows and curtains. Put on a radio or TV to help mask the sounds of the fireworks.
- 3) Pets should be kept indoors after dark as much as possible. If you are out in the dark, ensure that you have a good tight hold on your hound's lead(s)!
- 4) If you have any concerns then please speak to your Vet, who will be happy to give you further help / advice.

Bess and Jimmy represented the Kennel dogs on the day, and were impeccably behaved! Our team spoke to a lot of people so, hopefully, we will get some re-homings from this. It is crucially important to be seen at these Events, and any help is greatly appreciated.

Thanks to Kaz Brundell, who along with husband Pat, Michele, Nic (and of course Tara & Frodo!) had a table at a Fete held by the Care Home, in Dundee, where Kaz works. £56.00 was raised on the day, which was converted into dog food for the Kennels. Frodo and Tara also went into the Home, and met some of the residents!

Huge thanks to Kevin Cockburn, who generously donated his beautiful glasswork to be sold in order to raise funds for our homeless hounds.



The original cost of this glasswork was £900, but Kevin offered it to us in the hope that it would raise a reduced price of £450. To date, we have raised £110 towards our goal, and we would appeal to anyone who hasn't donated to think about doing so ... any amount would be gratefully received and, of course, goes directly to our homeless hounds - £450 would feed the dogs for a month! The glasswork would be displayed at the Kennels.
