Rab back in Training !

Having exhausted all my dogs in training I decided a good challenge would be to take one of the homeless hounds along to training. My first choice was Dusk as she sits of her own accord and is very obliging however she had other ideas and decided to go into season the Saturday before training started. That meant Rab was it! A big challenge as he's full of energy even after he had been "done". However we thought that this would help him get rid of some of his energy and train him a wee bit to become more "re-homable".



The first night of training.

Went to collect Rab from Union Farm, as usual he bounced all over me for 5 minutes while I tried to aim to clip his lead on, he then dragged me to the car. Not a good start!! We were the first to arrive so I tried to accustom him to the room. More and more dogs came in and Rab stood wagging his tail at them all. Next the 2 smallest puppies arrived and of course they sat right next to me. Rab was an absolute gentleman had a sniff and a playful bark and quickly made friends with them. Everyone was looking at his muzzle but Debbie (the instructor) explained that he was not aggressive it was just a precaution as he was an ex racer who was trained to chase small furries. He was one of the best behaved dogs there even when an over enthusiastic lab was lunging at him trying to play! I was very proud of what fantastic PR he was giving to the breed dispelling all of the myths about greyhounds without me having to say a word!



Week 2: Started with us reuniting Rab with the puppies and then the dreaded recall. The recall is done in an enclosed area so although I knew he couldn't run away had serious doubts he would return to me straight away. I don't have the same bond with him as the others do with their "pet dogs". Debbie held him while I ran to the other end of the enclosure. As shouted for him and he ran straight to me! I was so pleased I didn't notice he wasn't slowing down and he managed to lift me right off the ground with his enthusiasm! We then tried a sit. Rab made it obvious he wasn't a fan, he will sit of his own accord but not on command. I even asked Debbie to try as I thought I might be doing something wrong but no, even with 2 of us trying he wasn't having it, so this is a challenge Ι have yet to master!

Next was controlled walking amongst dogs. Debbie used Rab to demonstrate. He was a perfect angel, paying attention to Debbie's commands and ignoring all the other dogs, was beaming with pride as I watched him walk round. Finally, Stay. First stay is always a very quick stay but by this time he had noticed the chickens on the other side of the fence and so ignored everything I said but considering he'd had such a good session I decided we could work on that later.



The test is in 4 weeks, I've no doubt he'll pass with flying colours (luckily sit is not a requirement!!). I am amazed at how well he behaved and proved to everyone else what we all know. Greyhounds are fantastic dogs.

Greys around the world

This month we have the start of a new article looking at other greyhound rescue sanctuaries from around the world. Our first one is Greyhound rescue inc based in Gerrardstown, West Virginia, USA.



It was founded in 1989 by John and Denise Davis. It is an all-volunteer, registered, nonprofit, charitable organization. John and Denise founded the rescue program after they adopted Stacey, a white, brindlepatched, ticked female who raced into their hearts. Their interest in the rescue effort developed into the formation of their own rescue organization. Since its inception, Greyhound Rescue, Inc. has placed over 2,000 Greyhounds in homes throughout Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, and Washington D.C.

The goal of Greyhound Rescue is to find highquality, loving homes for ex-racing Greyhounds and to educate people about the excellent, loving pets these noble creatures make. We are a relatively small organization, but are very active and dedicated.

We do not believe in overly restrictive placement policies. If you are a responsible, caring person and are willing to dedicate the attention that a Greyhound needs, please consider adopting one of these noble dogs through us.



Potential adoptees will have an interview (lasting about an hour) to determine which of their greys would best suit. The cost of the adoption is \$250.00 and is tax-deductible. As they are a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization all contributions are used to benefit greyhounds in their kennel. The fee covers the following:

Spay/neutering, Teeth Cleaning, Rabies vaccination, DHLP, De-worming, Heartworm negative check and Lyme test, Flea Treatment, Transportation costs from the kennel, Leash, collar, and Greyhound Rescue, Inc., ID tag and Owners' Manual.

One interesting event is the annual "Greyhounds reach the beach" This event is held in Dewey Beach, Delaware and is the largest gathering of retired racing greyhounds in the U.S. This isn't a Greyhound Rescue, Inc. event (its sponsored by <u>The Greyhound Project</u>), but because they are so close, they always have huge numbers of their dogs there. It is held every year over Columbus Day weekend, and attracts over 2000 greyhounds and over 1700 humans!!! (and people think that our dog show is busy !)

Greyhound Remembrance Weekend -July 25th & 26th

Greyhound racing in the UK began on July 24th 1926 at Belle Vue Stadium in Manchester.

Every year, on the nearest Saturday and Sunday to this date, we stage Greyhound Remembrance Weekend, in memory of the hundreds of thousands of dogs that have been abused and killed by the greyhound racing industry since that day.

The Weekend is marked by street stalls and demos/pickets on the Saturday and by remembrance ceremonies on the Sunday, when wreaths and flowers are laid outside greyhound stadiums, in memory of all the dogs that have suffered and been put to death.

We have divided the tasks into three main groups



Housekeeping—This needs dedicated volunteers who can go to the kennels on a regular basis perhaps this would suit a more local person. This would involve cleaning out the kennels, walking, feeding and grooming the homeless greyhounds so they look their best for their forever home.



Maintenance—We need diy people who are able to give their time to help maintain the Kennel site to repair and paint fences, maintain the kennel building, plumbing, electrics etc.



Fundraising—The kennels can not run without the essentials for the hounds food, lead, collar etc.
