Dog of the Month





Home Visits

For the past few years I have carried out home visits for people in Edinburgh and surrounding areas who would like to adopt a dog/dogs from Greyhound Rescue Fife. Celia and Jimmy have a team of people who do this for adopters living at a distance from the kennels at Baltree. I thought it might be interesting for Newsletter readers to see how I do this.

First of all, I contact the would-be adopters and arrange a time to visit. If this is to be their first greyhound, I ask if they would like me to bring one of my own dogs along. Invariably they say yes and Teigan would tell you that she is well experienced at sussing out suitable homes! Seriously, one thing she is very useful for is assessing whether the dogs may need coaching on going up or coming down internal or external stairs.

If the house has a garden, that's the first thing I look at. I'd say 75% of problems about adopting greyhounds relate to the garden. For instance, it may have a 6ft high hedge all round it but the hedge has gaps which a greyhound could get through chasing a squirrel or a cat. It's also important to look at any gates or exits and make sure these are dog proof. Of course, if the adopters live in a flat, that's one less thing to think about.

Once inside I have a good look round and see if I can spot anything which might be a danger to the dog. Patio doors are a typical example. I recommend putting duct tape across these at the dog's eye level until it has realised that this is glass, not an empty space. I may also suggest fitting a child gate to the stairs if they are steep or if the dog is going to be remaining downstairs.

Then I usually have a nice chat with the adopters. (Thank you folks for all the cups of coffee and biscuits!) If possible, I like to see everyone in the family, including children so that I get an impression of how life is in their home. Often they have done a lot of research on the internet and have compiled a set of questions to ask me. Typically we discuss:

- Beds. Where is the dog going to sleep and what sort of bed will it have.
- Routines. How many walks, how long, at what time of day. I always emphasise that there's no right answer to this that two 20-minute walks are plenty (although the dogs will probably be up for more than that if their humans wish to go further) and that the important thing is to establish a routine and keep to it.
- Food. How much and what type of food. I suggest two meals a day, splitting the amount of food the dog has been getting in the kennels between them. I emphasise the importance of feeding dried food that is low protein and suggest a few brands to them. I also advise having raised food bowls to avoid colic.
- Insurance. I say that it is vital to have insurance. I am often asked to recommend an insurance company but I do not do this. I tell them that they should research the various companies offering pet insurance and choose the one which suits their needs.
- Walks. Always walking on a lead and that we recommend using double leads for safety and a muzzle at least for the first few weeks until they are sure how the dog will react to non-greyhounds.
- House training. I say that in my experience, greyhounds are quick learners and so house training is usually fairly easy. I give them Celia's advice about initially taking the dog out every hour on the hour and making a huge fuss when it performs outside.

My final words are always "If there is any problem or anything you want to ask once you've got the dog, contact Celia who knows everything about greyhounds and is endlessly helpful.

I've met some really lovely people through doing the house checks and it's great when they adopt a dog and bring it to the greyhound walks or post about it on the Forum or on Facebook so I know how it is getting along. I'm pleased that in a small way I have helped quite a few dogs find their forever home.



Doggy Doos

Unfortunately Alabama Rot seems to have surfaced again in the UK, this is a flesh eating disease that dogs can pick up from mud on their paws and legs after a walk. This can be a very serious, often fatal disease if not spotted quick enough. This disease seems to like cold, damp mud so with the recent horrible weather vets are worried that this may lead to a rise in cases. Advice is to keep your dogs away from muddy and wet areas as well as washing mud from their paws after walks until the weather remains warmer. The first symptom tents to be a skin sore which has not been caused by an injury so keep an eye out and contact your vet if you are worried.
