


Your Stories

A Stressful Month!

Over the month of November we had a very busy and stressful month, all is okay now but it was not a fun month at all - and was the reason why I did not write a newsletter last month.

It all started with Sue, a small lump appeared on her lip. It didn't seem to cause her any discomfort and she was acting normally. We decided to take her to the vet to be on the safe side. They said that it could either be an inflammation or a tumour, to see if it was just an inflammation she went on a course of antibiotics for 5 days. If anything the lump just got bigger so we went back to the vet. At this point the vet confirmed that it was likely a benign tumour so booked her in for surgery to have it removed. Even though the vet was certain it was benign we were both worried all day. She came home that evening after she had recovered and cuddled us all night, she also had painkillers which she took like a wee star. The post-op appointment was promising - the vet said that she was healing well and the lab had confirmed that the tumour was indeed non-cancerous!

At last came the day for her to have the stitches removed, we were relieved that this would be our last visit to the vet for a long time.....or so we thought! Barry was playing in the garden and had managed to snap one of his claws in the grass. He didn't seem to be in pain unless we touched it but the amount of blood that came from it was unbelievable! We gave it a good wash and applied pressure with a bandage to stop the bleeding. Thankfully the vets were happy to see him at the same time as Sue and they managed to bandage him up and treat the pain. Poor wee man screamed the place down - he did get his own back though when he kicked the vet in the head!

Sue's stitches were removed with no issue and has healed well and Barry's claw has healed up nicely too.



Doggy Doos

Rawhide

It may surprise you to know that rawhide chews can be extremely dangerous for your hounds and are responsible for many dog deaths every year. Rawhide is the inner proportion of skin (normally from cows) that can not be used for clothing or furniture, it is seen as an industrial waste product which is why it is so cheap! The process used to make them involves adding toxic chemicals, glues and other compounds which can be harmful to your hound (see image below). They can pose choking hazard or become lodged in the digestive tract and may then require an emergency removal. In addition to this they can also cause vomiting, diarrhoea, stomach torsions and exposure to heavy metals (due to manufacturing methods). Being a pet product they are not subject to the same environmental health legislation as our food is.
