Doggy Doos

Quick Tip

Something we quickly realised after adopting Barry and Sue that we all found traditional nail clippers terrifying (us and the dogs!). So, we did a little bit of research into alternatives. By far the best solution we found were dog nail grinders. It works just like a mini dremel tool so you can gradually grind the nail down to the appropriate length. We use the torch on our phones to shine through the nail so we can see the quick (blood vessel in claw) so that there are no nasty accidents, some even come with small led lights for this purpose. It can be a bit noisy so give them time to get used to it and at their pace, even if that means one paw at a time.
